





Green cloth over boards, title and decorations stamped in dark green onto spine, 8vo (8-1/4 inches tall), pp. 256, illustrated with B&W photos. Volume with light edge wear, scattered soil and a light bump to text fore-edge, tape ghosts from holding a homemade jacket protector to endpapers, name in ink to front endpaper with the rubber stamp of the "Vancouver Area Flying Saucer Club" to ffep and bookseller's rubberstamp to rear pastedown. Price-clipped DJ has some rubbing and creases, closed tears, old tape ghosts verso and to flaps.


Good Plus in Good Plus dust jacket. Hardcover. (#1594) \$65.00 George Adamski claimed to have photographed spaceships from other planets, met with friendly Nordic alien Space Brothers, and to have taken flights with them to the Moon and other planets. He was the first, and most famous, of the so-called contactees of the 1950s. Ref, Wikipedia. Like they say - a picture is worth a thousand words - and his are to be found within, ie. taken from within a Venusian Scout Ship, as in picture #12.



Beige cloth over boards, title stamped in red and green onto spine, green endpapers, 8vo (8-5/16 x 5-5/8 inches), pp. 343. The first edition DJ measures 21.9 cm tall x 50.6 cm long, whereas this second edition, first state DJ measures 21.9 cm tall x 50.2 cm long. Volume with scattered spotting, heavy bump to head of spine, foot softened, faint tone to text, pencil erasure top ffep, top stain faded. Price intact DJ with light soil, rubbing, closed tears and fading to spine, chipping to edges and pencil tracing to back panel. Very Good minus in Good dust jacket. Hardcover. (#565) \$120.00 The second printing, first state, having the first edition statement removed from the copyright page and with 1949 on the title page; but without the acknowledgement for Yama added to the second paragraph of the copyright page. With the second printing DJ (which is 4 mm shorter than the first printing DJ). Certainly less common than the first edition, first printing, which consisted of 10,000 copies and was published in August, 1949; the first edition, second printing run consisted of only 2,500 copies and was printed in Sept. 1949. The third state, with 1949 on the copyright page, has the acknowledgement for Yama added to the second paragraph of the copyright page. 

Spine ends softened, faint offset to free endpapers from DJ flaps, else about fine in a very good jacket showing light rubbing and edge wear, shallow chipping at head of spine, soil and a stray pencil mark to rear panel. This Southern author's first of eleven novels. "Mr. Basso writes dialogue as exact and straightforward as Hemingway's or Morley Callaghan's; but he has a greater range than these writers, and he dares try for, and achieves beauties of style and subtleties of understanding that the modern realists do not even attempt."- from the front flap. Awesome art deco DJ shows mankind chained to the machinery of industrial progress.







Cream cloth over boards, title and decorations stamped in silver, gilt and green onto upper board and spine, publisher's device stamped in blind onto lower board, all edges gilt, square 8vo (9-1/8 inches tall), pp. 296, decorative green and gilt cloth endpapers, illustrated throughout with 119 engravings. The plain DJ is maroon in color with no text or images printed on it. This would make sense as this edition came in a box priced at \$3.00, according to contemporary ads dated December 1891. Of further interest with the DJ is that the paper backing for the linen appears to be the same calendered paper used in the text block (a little more toned, perhaps due to it's greater exposure), also there is age appropriate *lack* of fading to the cloth of the board turn-ins where the DJ flaps have covered and protected the cloth for so long. Volume has light soil and toning, fraying to spine ends, shelf wear and a tiny crack in cloth at bottom edge of lower board with p.o.gift inscription dated Christmas, 1891 and name in pencil to 3rd. fep. DJ with minimal chipping, soil and closed tears, some spots of cloth lifting from paper backing with fade to spine and a few tape repairs verso. A scarce find in the original paper-backed linen dust jacket. Very Good in Very Good dust jacket. Hardcover. (#1451)\$275.00

The story of two young lovers living on the island of Mauritius who are corrupted by the false, artificial sentimentality that prevailed at the time among the upper classes of France. Written on the eve of the French Revolution, the novel is hailed as Bernardin's finest work and was originally published in French in 1788. This is the first Altemus edition. (#1579) \$75.00 Crow arrived in Shanghai in 1911 and made the city his home for a quarter of a century. He was the founding editor of the Shanghai Evening Post and Mercury and wrote 13 books during the 30's and 40's. Adapted and filmed in French as Terrain Vague in 1960, the film presented a look at juvenile delinquency in Paris and was based on Tomboy, the second of Ellson's fifteen JD novels. Tomboy followed his first novel Duke, and tells the story of a young Manhattan gal who '... could whip half the boys in the gang, and she was leader of the "debs" '. Tomboy was followed by The Golden Spike (released as Reefer Boy in UK) by Ellson in 1952. JD artwork on the front panel by "Hoffman", text includes an introduction by Dr. Frederic Wertham.





This is the first edition, fourth printing of this title and the first printing to feature the iconic DJ artwork of Pat Marriott.





Publisher's heavy paper wraps (dated 1900) printed in black and red are bound-in. Back cover of wrap has publisher's ad for the 1899 release of One Hundred Merrie and Delightsome Stories. The 22 copper plate illustrations show well registered plate marks and sharp images. Volume has light soil and wear to covers with some leaves roughly opened, the odd crease and occasional finger soil to text noted, scattered foxing mostly to wraps, endpapers appear previously replaced. Title page has a penciled correction (asume by publisher) changing the address to rue de Chateaudun, Carrington's new address where he published and sold erotica in Paris.
